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1 Objectives

The PCC has the responsibility of co-operating with the incumbent, in promoting in the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It has maintenance responsibilities for All Hallows, St Mary's and St James the Less.

2 Electoral Roll

The number on the electoral roll for 2024 was 125, three less than the previous year. The number on roll now will be reported at the APCM.

3 Report on Activities

3.1 PCC Report – Andrew Hobley

The PCC is the body which governs our decisions as a community. Between April 2025 and March 2026 PCC met six times. PCC Standing Committee also met six times.

All members of PCC are Charity Trustees and as such have legal responsibility for the decisions we make. One major subject of discussion was how much the parish should be contributing the Diocesan Common Mission Fund.

We continued to support CMS and the work of Anna and Chris Hembury in Hull, and Medical Aid for Palestine, and decided to support NeighborCare and Whitchurch in Bloom.

PCC has also kept abreast of safeguarding developments, kept an eye on health and safety, received regular reports from the Treasurer and Church Wardens, discussed the use of the Church Room as well as debated a range of issues brought by members of the PCC on their own behalf or that of members of the congregation. We have approved various works of repair and refurbishment. Although no major decisions were made without the PCC we would have leaking roofs, no chancel lights, blocked toilets, and general air of dilapidation.

Throughout this time PCC members expressed not only their views, but the views of those who they were elected to serve - the wider parish. I am grateful for members ability to agree - or to agree to disagree politely, and for the time and effort they have put into meetings.

3.2 Churchwarden Report – Catherine Geddes and Nigel Scarfe

As we reflect on the past year, we give thanks to God for the churches of All Hallows, Litchfield and Tufton, where we have gathered to worship, to be fed and then sent out in the power of the Spirit to love and serve the Lord. The church is the people, the body of Christ, taking Christ to our neighbours in all we say and do. We also have inherited three beautiful buildings which declare God's continued presence amongst us, sometimes providing shelter to those who need it and a place of spiritual nourishment and peace.

Keeping the church buildings open and in good order is therefore a priority and to that end general maintenance has continued throughout the year. All Hallows has received the most attention – the blocked drains were cleared, the dramatic roof leak fixed, and the chancel lights switched on. Hurrah!! The front door will hopefully be returned to its former glory in the near future. We give thanks to God for the plumbers, electricians, painters, cleaners and everyone else who has lifted a paint brush or pushed a Hoover, turned out at a moment's notice and answered all Catherine's questions with grace and understanding.

During the vacancy so many people have taken on extra work, not least Vicky and Richard in the office, Rev Russ and the whole ministry team. Others have continued week by week to clean, ring bells, sing, play the piano and organ, organise the sound system, manage spreadsheets, make tea, organise children's activities, welcome and support one another. For each and every one we give thanks to God.

Annual Report for 2025

We would like to thank the PCC for their tremendous support and hard work. Nigel will be standing down at the forthcoming APCM but we are delighted that Andrew Hobley has agreed to stand for election.

There have been many highlights and memorable moments: David's farewell service, the extremely hot day of the fete, the fabulous Mozart concert, the joyful Christmas tree festival, the Pilgrimage walk around the benefice to name but a few.

As we look forward to a time of change, we trust the God who has blessed us so graciously over the past year, to continue to guide us and lead us as we seek to use the resources we have to glorify him. May we constantly be aware of his calling to serve our community and one another.

3.3 Choir - Stephen Preece

The choir has served faithfully through the last year, and looking back, it was a very busy year indeed!

We assembled the "Benefice Choir" at somewhat short notice to mark Bishop David's leaving for Truro and his farewell service in the Deanery on the 9th February. The massed voices of Barton Stacey Chamber Choir and the Singing for Fun group joined us filling the chancel with over 40 singers, and lifting the roof with 3 anthems, 4 hymns and 2 descants.

On Easter Sunday we launched our new Communion setting, going back to Schubert's German Mass, having been using Joanna Forbes LeStrange's setting for the previous 5 years. The Sanctus is a particular favourite but it has been good to get to know the Gloria and Agnus Dei from this setting.

The choir were asked to sing for a wedding on the 26th April. I wouldn't normally include these but as this featured a choir anthem in Welsh, the Calon Lan, and the bride also asked us to sing the vocal elements of the receding voluntary from the Sound of Music, it was worth including.

Reverend David then told us that he too would be leaving, so we had a second farewell service to plan. On the 1st June we therefore assembled the Benefice Choir again, and sent David and Amy off in some style with the Vivaldi Gloria that we had sung at their welcome service, Rutter's "May the Lord bless you and keep you" and concluding with a magnificent rendition of Handel's Halleluiahs Chorus - a first for me as a conductor and a real treat.

Some of the choir were involved in the Mozart Requiem concert in November so we moderated our ambition in the lead up to that but we did manage to sing a Ukranian Kontakion for the Dead at the Remembrance Service.

Our Christmas carol service was on the 21st December and the choir were wonderful as always, performing three new carols: Christmas Canon of Peace, A New Noel and Gold for a manger bed, as well as descants for all 6 congregation carols.

Some particular thanks to be noted: first to Andrew for your skill and patience accompanying us for every choir practice, to Robert for working with me to make it all happen, to Sophie for sharing the load, and to everyone who thanks us occasionally for a piece of music that moved them – that really helps and encourages us!

3.4 Bell Ringers Report – Jenny James

Although the band have not managed many quarter peals in the last few years, this year we achieved six. Amongst the occasions, a 50th birthday was celebrated, we started the Folk Festival and marked David Roches's last service. We also rang for VE and VJ days, and marked Remembrance Day with half muffles. Three funerals were also half muffled. Weddings are fewer these days, so only two to ring for.

We had visitors to ring a peal, and a ringing school also used our bells. The Beavers almost came for the evening but a power cut made things tricky so they will return in the New Year.

Members went on a popular ringing outing to London, and other towers came to us for a fun Learn to Splice afternoon. We also entered a handmade bell rope festooned tree for the Christmas Tree Festival.

3.5 Parish Magazine – Gill Knappett

The magazine year runs from April to March. Twelve copies a year continue to be produced. The cost to buy a magazine in 2025 remained at £1 (£10 for the whole year to subscribers including local delivery) but it was decided that it will increase to £1.50 per copy (£15 to subscribers for the year) from April 2026. This decision was taken as printing costs have been increasing but the magazine price had remained the same for 10 years.

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The magazine generated approximately £8,000 profit for the church in 2024 (£9,000 in 2023); at the time of compiling this report, it is likely that 2025 profits will be around the same as 2024. Net income is reducing year on year as it becomes more difficult to attract advertisers and subscribers. The use of free social media and people choosing to seek information online continues to affect the number of advertisers and subscribers (and also the number of people who think to use the parish magazine to provide articles about up-coming local events which sadly reduces its usefulness and appeal). However, we rely on the income from advertisers to make a profit from the magazine.

Subscribers - At the time of compiling this report, printed copies are now purchased by 619 subscribers (630 in 2024); additional copies are sold in the paper shop and 7 are purchased by on-line subscribers.

Sarah Owen (one of the copy editors) has been delivering spare magazines to different roads around the town for several months, with a note to encourage new subscribers.

Advertising -Mary Cope took on the role of administering the advertising in 2024 and did it again in 2025; she agreed to do it for three years so 2026 is expected to be the last year. As previously reported, we needed a new person on board in early 2026 to shadow her and take over the role but no one came forward to learn the role.

Vicky Jennings in the Admin Office helped with some following up of advertising contacts in 2025.

The number of advertisers remained the same in 2025 as for 2024 (we lost some and gained some new ones).

New members of magazine team - In 2025 we were delighted to welcome Pat Sydes who joined the news editing team. David Simmonds stood down as a distributor and grateful thanks are given to him for his years of service in this role. We are grateful that Dorrie Bilson has taken on the round, assisted by Anne Hill and Jane Glendening.

More hands still needed - As requested several times both in the magazine and on the weekly All Hallows newsletter we still need the following help:

- Additional layout editor.
- Someone to take over the advertising for 2027–28.

To date no one has stepped forward to take on either role. (At the time of writing the report, Mary has now done the advertising for 2026 single-handed, so no one has learned the role for next year and beyond.)

The roles do not need to be filled by a member of the congregation, although this would be the ideal.

The future of the magazine - If no one is willing to take on the advertising role in particular, the future of the magazine will need to be considered during 2026.

3.6 Children's Ministry (Sunday School) – Ann Simmonds and Sarah Smart

We have continued with our rhythm of all-age services once a month and it has been a joy to see members of the congregation of all ages engaging with God in creative ways, exploring different ways of engaging with God, the Bible and prayer.

The all-age service on Good Friday provided another brilliant opportunity to tell the events of the first Easter. It was such a pleasure to work with YoG on all elements of the service which included music, drama, prayer and creativity which included constructing edible Easter gardens!

On Easter Sunday itself we had a bumper turnout, with 18 children and some parents and grandparents engaged in a lively time in the Church Rooms. This was followed by the traditional Easter Egg Hunt in the Churchyard which was generously provided and organised by Caroline Simpson and greatly enjoyed by the participants.

Consistency of those attending on Sunday mornings continues to be a challenge in terms of gaining any momentum and growth for ministry among children and families. We introduced Packs in Pews for children to use over the Summer and continuing for Sundays surrounding school holidays and whilst the Crib and Christmas tree occupied the children's area. These packs have a variety of materials, including puzzles based on the season of the church year or on the lectionary readings, colouring, stickers, simple crafts, bible stories and fidget toys. The hope is that there is something for most ages to engage with. In the Autumn we moved our activities back into the Children's Area in church for most Sundays with a bible reading linked to the lectionary and associated crafts, puzzles and other activities.

As we move into 2026 we would love to think creatively around what that ministry looks like at All Hallows. However, we end this year very thankful to God for the children and families at All Hallows and the depth of relationships held among the children and young people.

We would like to thank everyone for all of your continued support and prayer.

3.7 Youth of God– Carlos Ferreira

Over the past year, the Youth of God (YOG) group has continued to meet regularly, giving young people a space to explore the Christian faith together in a relaxed and supportive environment. The aim of the group has been to help them grow in their understanding of Jesus, build friendships within the church, and think about how faith fits into everyday life.

During the year we held 14 sessions, including youth gatherings and social evenings after YOG services. Attendance averaged around eight young people. Although the group is small, this has worked well in allowing more open discussion and helping everyone feel comfortable sharing their thoughts and questions.

Sessions tend to follow a simple and familiar structure – time to settle in and chat, an opening prayer, a Bible reading, a short explanation or teaching, and then discussion. We usually include an activity or game linked to the theme, and finish with a short time of reflection.

Our theme this year has been “Rooted in Christ”. We’ve spent time looking at what it means to build our lives on Jesus and to grow in faith, especially through Jeremiah 17 and John 15 where Jesus speaks about being the true vine. As part of this, the group made a large tree poster, adding their names and some of their hopes for the year. It became a simple but helpful reminder that faith grows over time when it’s rooted in Christ. We also made paper footsteps to reflect the idea of following in Jesus’ steps.

Across the year we looked at a range of themes based on the life and teaching of Jesus. One area we focused on was the belief that we are created and loved by God. We talked about what it means to be made in God’s image, using passages from Genesis and the Gospels, and this led into conversations about kindness, generosity and how we treat others. We also spent time on forgiveness and repentance, using the Lord’s Prayer as a starting point. In particular, the line “forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us” led to some honest conversations about mistakes, forgiveness, and the importance of grace in our relationships.

Several sessions focused more directly on different parts of Jesus’ ministry.

Jesus the teacher - We looked at the Sermon on the Mount and discussed how Jesus’ teaching applies in everyday life.

Jesus the healer - The group wrote prayers for people and situations in need of healing. These included prayers for peace, for those facing poverty and hunger, and for healing in communities.

Jesus the servant - Using the story of Jesus washing the disciples’ feet, we talked about what it means to serve others. Rather than acting it out, we focused on the kind of everyday acts of service we often avoid, and how we might do these quietly without looking for recognition.

Youth-led services - YOG has continued to be involved in the worship life of the church through youth-led services. In November, the service followed the theme “Rooted in Christ, Growing in Love”, with readings from Jeremiah 17 and John 15, focusing on staying rooted in Christ.

In March, the service focused on the Sermon on the Mount and Jesus’ teaching that we are the salt of the earth, with readings from Isaiah 58 and Matthew 5. At the end of the service, small bags of salt were given out as a reminder of the role Christians are called to play in the world.

Some of the young people have also begun to get involved in the worship band, helping to lead through singing and playing instruments. This has been a really positive step in building confidence and helping them feel more part of the wider church.

Alongside the teaching, time spent together socially has been an important part of the group.

- Activities this year have included:
- A trip to Go Ape at Alice Holt Forest
- A hot chocolate evening on the cricket pitch
- A pizza and film night where we watched Bruce Almighty and talked about prayer and trusting God
- A Christmas party with games, including a ping pong cup challenge and dressing each other up as Christmas trees

These kinds of evenings have helped create a relaxed atmosphere where friendships can grow naturally.

Over the past year I have continued to build on my training in areas connected to youth work and safeguarding. I completed courses in domestic abuse awareness, basic and foundation safeguarding awareness, and local leadership awareness training. Sophie has also completed domestic abuse awareness training and schools work training during this academic year, which has been really valuable in supporting the group.

Safeguarding continues to be taken seriously within YOG. All activities are run in line with the church's safeguarding policy, with the aim of making sure the young people are supported in a safe and appropriate environment.

Sophie and I would like to continue developing the group and encourage more young people to get involved. We are planning to visit Whitchurch Church of England Primary School to help raise awareness locally, and we also hope to make better use of church and benefice newsletters to promote YOG. Over the summer, we would like to include more outdoor sessions, making the most of time outside while still creating space for conversation and reflection. Our hope is simply to see more young people come along, feel welcome, and find their place within the life of the church.

I would like to thank the PCC, church leadership, parents, and everyone who supports the young people involved in YOG. Your support makes it possible for the group to continue.

3.8 Small Group – Catherine Geddes

Small groups remain a valuable and encouraging part of church life. In chapter one of Paul's letter to Philemon Paul says 'I always thank God as I remember you in my prayers'. We have several groups who meet regularly to pray together, some with a particular focus eg the vacancy, our children and the community.

Paul goes on to say 'I pray that you may be active in sharing your faith, so that you will have a full understanding of every good thing we have in Christ.' Talking about our faith and reading the bible together are essential for our faith to grow and flourish. Following Andrew Holey's homily on the Nicene Creed one group thoroughly enjoyed working through the Creed week by week. It was both enlightening and challenging.

The phrase 'full understanding' certainly applied to the Advent study – Christmas, the Good, the Bad and the Ugly. This study focussed on the lesser characters of the Christmas story, challenging us to look beyond the nativity stereotypes and think about their motivation and contribution to the most important birth of all time.

This lent we have tried a new format, meeting together for lunch in the Church Rooms and hearing from a range of speakers who have shared a 'thought for the day'. The Drawing Near to God resources have provided daily readings, prayers and weekly themes which we have then discussed over a simple lunch.

I give thanks to God for the resources, both people and materials, that we have available to us, but most of all for the freedom to meet together.

3.9 Safeguarding – Revd Rus Smart and Gill Bilton

The Safeguarding Team at All Hallows continues to do an excellent job overseeing safeguarding in the church and across the benefice. Vicky Jennings (Benefice Safeguarding Administrator) and Paul Barber (Parish Safeguarding Officer) work with Revd Russ to make sure the church remains a safe place for all. Regular communication between the team and the diocese ensures we stay up to date on any changes that take place.

Much of Vicky's time is spent sorting out DBS applications and reminding people to complete safeguarding training. She uses the online Safeguarding Dashboard to monitor progress of individuals and PCCs to make sure everyone remains compliant. Over the last year the dashboard has expanded to include greater accountability for PCCs and now has an area for the safer recruitment of volunteers. This includes further checks on many volunteer roles within the church. Some people will be asked to complete an application form, provide references, sign a confidential declaration form, undertake safeguarding training, complete a DBS check, and meet with a leader for induction, training and regular supervision. All of this is to ensure our team of volunteers across the benefice are trained, supported and safe to work with.

Vicky also oversees the risk assessments across the benefice making sure our churches remain safe places. She works with churchwardens and other group leaders to ensure these are regularly reviewed. Vicky does an amazing job with all of this and we are very thankful for her hard work and commitment.

At All Hallows, Paul Barber continues to deal with any questions or concerns that may arise. He oversees the work with children, young people and vulnerable adults to make sure any issues are dealt with promptly. We are so grateful to him for giving his time and expertise in this role.

Our wider safeguarding team at All Hallows also includes our youth and children's champions: Carlos Ferreira, Sophie Lloyd, Ann Simmonds, and Sarah Smart. Our vulnerable adults' champions are Marilyn Berridge, Dorrie Bilson, and

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Peter Taylor. Anyone in the church can speak to these people if they have any safeguarding questions or concerns. We are very grateful to them for serving us in this way.

Each year in November we highlight Safeguarding Sunday in the church and remind people of the importance of safeguarding for everyone. We hope this annual reminder will reinforce all that we are doing and highlight any changes to our congregation.

Our PCC and Standing Committee have safeguarding as a regular agenda item at our meetings and we continue to discuss our progress, holding ourselves accountable to them. If anyone has any questions or concerns, please contact Paul, Russ, or Vicky and we will be happy to help.

Thank you again for all that you do in keeping our churches a safe place for everyone.

3.10 Deanery Synod – Sue Bailey

Whitchurch Deanery comprises the parishes that lie between A303 and the Berkshire border from Longparish/East Woodhay in the west to Ashford Hill/ North Waltham in the east. The population is around 25,000 and the size of the individual parishes vary considerably. Responsibilities include the co-ordination of the CMF, training of lay-led services, strategic development and growth of congregations and ministry within the Deanery.

1. Four meetings were held during 2025 in February, June, September & November.
2. We said adieu to our former Area Dean, Rev. David Roche who has been succeeded by Rev. James Russell. The former Bishop of Basingstoke, Rt. Rev. David Williams moved to become Bishop of Truro and we welcomed his successor the Rt. Rev. Kelly Betteridge. In June our Lay Chair, Jonathan Taylor, stood down after 18 years devoted service and was succeeded by Peter Hull – we welcome him and our new Area Dean, Rev. James.

3.11 Litchfield– Revd Mark Christian

A year of change at St. James-the Less. We were sad to see the departure of Rev. Sue Hart and would like to thank the benefice Clergy and LLM's for covering our services. Rev Mark Christian returned in August providing temporary cover, becoming permanent in January to cover services here and at St. James, Woodcott.

We had a successful Flower festival on 27th - 29th celebrating Jane Austen's local connections, her novels and her involvement with the church. Music and readings were performed on Saturday 28th.

We had a delightful Christmas with a carol service and 52 adults, 8 children (and a dog!) attending our services.

4 Clergy report on the year – Reverend Russell Smart

It has been another busy year in the life of the Benefice and the clergy team have been working hard, along with the wider ministry team and our amazing team of volunteers who make everything happen week by week.

In February we said goodbye to Bishop David at a Deanery service at All Hallows. It was a lovely occasion to get together to give thanks for his support and encouragement to us over many years.

In June Revd David Roche moved on to a new post as Head of Chaplaincy in the NHS Hospital Trust in South London and Maudsley. We had a wonderful celebration service and were able to give thanks for all his ministry across our Benefice. He is greatly missed by us! This began the time consuming process of finding a new Incumbent for our Benefice.

Also in June, Revd Georgi was ordained priest at Winchester Cathedral. It was lovely to celebrate with her as she took on greater responsibility across the Benefice.

In July Revd Sue Hart moved on from her post in Litchfield to a new Benefice in Salisbury Diocese. Sadly she was only with us a short time. We are very thankful to Revd Mark Christian for stepping in and covering the services in Litchfield and Woodcott during their vacancy.

Over the last year the clergy team have been busier with Revd David's departure. The team has managed to keep our regular pattern of services going, as well as meeting the needs of our communities through weddings, baptisms, funerals, pastoral visiting, and home communions. They have committed themselves to safeguarding training and other training opportunities through the diocese. Throughout the summer many church fetes and fayres have been a joy to the clergy team as they have engaged with more of the wider community.

The clergy team continue to serve in our four local primary schools across the Benefice with collective worship, church visits, Prayer Spaces, and governor visits.

Russ has been busy with developing the work to children and families across the Benefice. Much of this is happening in schools and through our Sunday morning family services, plus various events and activities throughout the year. It has been wonderful to see the growth in the Longparish family service and the toddler group there. Russ has noticed the extra workload in the vacancy and has been juggling this over the last year. However, the clergy team have been wonderful at sharing the load so it has made it bearable!

Over the last year Georgi and Chris have taken a lead with offering services in the Bere Hill Care Home and Wessex Lodge, which has been greatly appreciated by the staff and residents there. Chris continues to oversee the monthly Chatter Café in the White Hart, while Georgi has been the Chaplain to the Royal British Legion in Whitchurch since David left. Georgi also works for the Diocese as the Faith and Generosity Advisor.

Nicky has been very busy with her chaplaincy role at Naomi House and Jacksplace while studying for an MA in Healthcare Chaplaincy. She has also been fundraising for her trek to the Himalayas in 2026. Richard works hard as the Benefice Office Manager overseeing Vicky and all the administration across the Benefice. He continues with his regular Zoom services online for those unable to attend church and he has been supporting the vicar in the North West Hampshire Benefice who needed some ordained support for services, and as their interim treasurer as they bring together four of their churches into one combined parish. He also recently became the Deanery Treasurer, helping parishes with their finances.

Gordon has helped with more services over the last year which has been invaluable since David left. He has also been supporting Philip Geddes through his discernment process for ordination, which has been a great help to us.

In September and October, Dodie went to Uganda again to support the work going on there with the Mityana Projects Trust and also help to train some Lay Readers. She took eight others from across the Deanery. Along with other clergy, she has continued in supporting and encouraging many people in our rural parishes. Within the Benefice there have been highlights including the major festivals as well as Family Services and celebrations. These and other different activities and services across the year have strengthened relationships with the local communities. Some of the clergy have been able to help parishes in the Deanery during their interregnums.

Also in October, Nicky led our first Baby Loss service in All Hallows and we had good attendance for this service. We would like to do this again. Bishop Kelly joined the diocese in November and some of the clergy team had chance to meet her which was lovely. And when Christmas came everyone worked so hard and we had a great turnout at all our services which was really encouraging!

A big thank you to everyone who has worked so hard over this last year. You have been amazing.

5 Financial Statement**5.1 All Hallows Whitchurch and St Mary's Tufton Financial summary for 2025**
